



Mission



The Special Operations Mountain Warfare Training Center (SOMWTC), trains, certifies, and sustains United States Special Operations Forces (USSOF) personnel in all Military Mountain Operations, including advanced high altitude mountain operations, technical terrain exploitation, and extreme cold weather survival in order to conduct worldwide MMO supporting and achieving U.S. policies, strategic goals and objectives.

On order, SOMWTC supports Theater Special Operations Commands (TSOC) objectives through the deployment of SOMWTC instructors to augment Special Forces Operational Detachment – Alphas (SFOD-As).

Expanded Purpose



Expanded Purpose: SOMWTC is the USSOCOM Mountain Warfare Lead Component responsible for establishing training standards, instruction, student certifications, doctrine, regulations, while advising USSOF Commanders on MMO worldwide.

- 1. Meet USASOC MMO certification requirements by training USSOF in technical exploitation of mountainous environments.
- 2. Conduct annual Critical Task Review Boards (CTRBs) for Summer Mountain Operator Course (SMOC) and Winter Mountain Operator Course (WMOC) providing USASOC and USSOCOM updates to MMO doctrine.
- 3. Observe, assess and validate all AFSOC, MARSOC & NSW Mountain Warfare training programs and equipment fielding (JSATs/JSOTs).
- 4. Operationalize SOMWTC instructors to supplement MMO expertise throughout USSOF in support of strategic U.S. objectives.



School History



- 1996 Special Forces Mountain Program created within 10th SFG (A)
- 2009 34x Mountain SFOD-A's within the Special Forces Regiment
- 2010 Program transitioned from 10th SFG(A) to USA Special Force Command
 G3 (USASFC) and the 1st Special Warfare Training Group (SWTG (A))
- 2011 Achieved SOCOM Joint SOF Assessment Team (JSAT) Validation
- 2012 Program returned to 10th SFG(A) from 1st SWTG(A) due to sustain reqs.
- 2021 USASOC Regulation 350-12: 'Special Operations Mountain Warfare Program' updated and rewritten, PDSI Approved (C3B, C4B)
- 2022 US Army HRC approved ASI for SMOC and WMOC graduates





Alpine Mobility Skills Course (AMSC)



Optional Perquisite to the WMOC, participant must be graduate of the SMOC to attend

- Ski Movement Fundamentals
- Introduction to Backcountry Skiing
- Conduct Survival Skiing Techniques
- Graduates of the AMSC learn to ski at an intermediate level and are more likely to pass the ski assessment during WMOC
- Course Length: 2 weeks (1 Phase)
- 1 Courses per year
- Throughput: 24x graduates per year





Supporting the Regiment



- (1) All Special Forces Groups will maintain a minimum of one Mountain Detachment per Battalion. In addition to these requirements, all (AD) and (ARNG) Special Forces Groups will maintain a minimum of one winter-certified Mountain Detachment (out of the minimum required number of three).
- (2) Winter-certified Mountain Detachments (Level One) will consist of, at a minimum, two Winter Mountain Operators, two Summer Mountain Operators, and the remainder current Basic Mountain Operators, Summer *and* Winter.
- (3) Summer-certified Mountain Detachments (Level Two) will consist of, at a minimum, four Summer Mountain Operators and the remainder current BMO-Summer.

Support to Global Special Operations:

SOMWTC operationalizes instructors to supplement MMO expertise throughout USSOF in support of strategic U.S. objectives.

Support to SOCOM Mountain Operations:

SOMWTC provides senior instructors to conduct joint assessments and validations of other SOF mountain warfare schools, including NSW, AFSOC, MARSOC, and partner nation mountain programs.

Instructor Training



SOMWTC Instructor Profile:

- -Post-team time Winter Mountain Operators (C4B).
- -ALL instructors REQUIRED to be WMOC certified (C4B).
- -Levied instructors often arrive unqualified (Requires ASI).
- -SOMWTC must train these instructors "in house" prior to utilization.
- -SOMWTC prefers to receive instructors with operational military mountaineering experience

- -Summer Mountain Operator Course (7 weeks)

- -AIARE Level 1/2 (1 Week)
- -AIARE Pro (1 Week)
- -Rigging for Rescue (2 Weeks)
- -PSIA Level 1 (1 Week)
- -Wilderness First Responder (WFR) (1 week)
- -SMOC Instructor Certification (6 weeks)
- -WMOC Instructor Certification (6 weeks)
- -Special Operations Instructor Course (SOIC) (2 Weeks)

*SOMWTC Instructors have a MINIMUM 39 weeks training invested.
